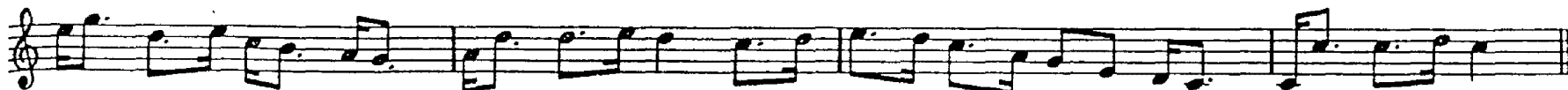


CAPE COLONY Song

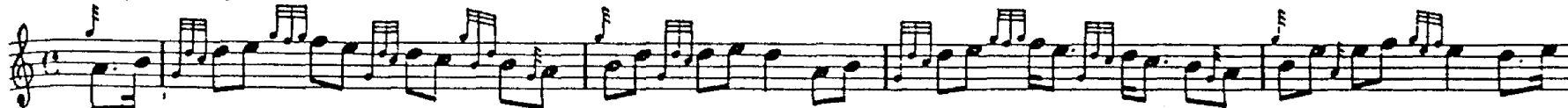
